

A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

To each pupil of Dollar Academy,

The aim of these sessions is to prepare players for competitive play in a fun and challenging weekly session. The club offers varied match-play in both singles and doubles games and is an excellent opportunity to improve match practice. The club runs several tournaments during the year at three different age levels for boys and girls, as well as both the Academy's Cranfield Cup Inter-house tournament and a Staff vs. Pupil mixed doubles event. There are opportunities for players to represent the school in the Central Schools Tournament and further national events. Friendly matches are also arranged between Dollar and other schools in Central region. At the end of each term, tournaments are played, with players receiving handicaps to allow younger or less advanced players to compete on equal terms. Players who perform well in these fixtures are selected to play in team matches, and to represent the school in the above events. The club has been highly successful in recent years and has won several trophies.

Ballroom Dancing

Kit required: Comfortable shoes (not trainers)

Cost £37 per term.

Ballroom Dancing offers an ideal opportunity to relax, have fun, meet friends and keep fit, as well as learn a very sociable skill. Each class lasts for forty five minutes and pupils learn a variety of Latin American as well as Rock 'n' Roll dances. The Beginners' class works towards Bronze medals while more experienced pupils attempt Silver, Gold and Scottish Awards. Classes are not solely for one year group but are organised according to ability and prior experience. The classes take place in the Assembly Hall and pupils are asked to wear comfortable shoes that are not trainers.

Basketball

Chess school attendees will develop their ability to solve problems creatively by developing their understanding and ability in the game of chess. Chess stimulates areas of thought in logical progression, creativity, strategy, organisation, time management, risk analysis and many other aspects of mental processing. It's also great fun!

Chess Club

Fridays 12.30-1.00pm. Location: Prep School. Terms 1 & 2. Further details from Mrs Barbour (Prep School)

Chess Club is for children who can play and for beginners. The children will develop their ability to solve problems creatively by developing their understanding of the game. They will have lots of fun learning while playing with other pupils and seniors.

Choir (Prep School)

Prep 4 & 5. Thursday lunchtimes. Location: G9. Terms 1 & 2. Further details from Mrs Duff (Music)

To have fun singing together and to prepare pieces for the Christmas Concert in the Perth Concert Hall and the Prep and Junior Concert in March.

Choir (Junior School)

Junior I & 2. Thursdays 3.30 – 4.30pm Location: Music Department. Terms 1 & 2. Further details from Mr Leslie or members of the Music department.

It is open to all pupils in the Junior School who enjoy singing. Around fifty pupils participate in this activity on a regular basis. Performances are given at the Perth Concert Hall and at the Junior Concert in the Auditorium before the Easter holidays.

Choir (Forms I & II)

Rehearsals Thursdays 3.30–4.30pm. Location: Auditorium. Terms 1 & 2. Further details from Mrs Timney or members of the Music department.

This is an opportunity to come along and sing a variety of music from classical to popular with Form I and II boys and girls. Term I will concentrate on music for the Christmas Concert in the Perth Concert Hall, where the choir will sing on stage with the senior choirs. During Term II, the choir will work towards the Form I/II March Concert.

All pupils will benefit from vocal warm-ups and technique as well as extending their choral repertoire. They will experience the excitement of performing in live situations and build their confidence in vocal singing.

Choir - Chamber Choir

Form III – VI. Wednesday lunchtimes and Wednesday 4.30-5.00pm. Location: Music Department. Terms 1 & 2.

Further details from Mr Morley (Music)

This is a smaller group drawn from the Senior Mixed Choir, for whom auditions are held at the beginning of term. The repertoire is varied and a number of different styles of choral singing are encompassed. Last session, as well as contributing to church services and concerts, the choir participated in a number of external charity and community events.

Choir - Senior Mixed Voice

Form III – VI. Rehearsals Wednesdays 3.30 - 5.00pm. Location: Auditorium. Terms 1 & 2. Full choir usually consists of around 140 members. Further details from Mr Morley (Music)

Mixed Voice Choir gives pupils in Forms III to VI the opportunity to sing in a large choir. There is no audition necessary and everyone can take part. The ability to read music is not essential and a warm welcome is extended to all who share a love of choral singing. We tackle a wide variety of repertoire including classical, pop and folk songs. The Choir performs in the annual Christmas Concert at Perth Concert Hall and in the March Choral Concert at school. Recent performances have ranged from the Scottish premiere of Bob Chilcott's *Christmas Night and* Howard Blake's *The Snowman* to the first UK school performance of *Stella Natalis* by Karl Jenkins and Queen's *Bohemian Rhapsody*.

Christian Union

Form I – VI Tuesdays 11.15-11.30am. Location: Y08. Terms 1, 2 and 3. Further details from Mrs Cook (Chemistry), Mr Gibb (Maths) or Mr Muirhead (Art & Design)

An informal meeting open to all Senior School pupils whether they have a Christian faith or are interested in asking questions or finding out more. Pupils are able to discuss issues and share their thoughts in a supportive and non-judgmental atmosphere as well as encourage each other in their faith. Tea, coffee and cakes/biscuits are provided.

Coding Club

Form I – VI, Tuesdays and Wednesdays 12.35-1.20pm. Location: Y15. Terms 1, 2 and 3. Further details from Mr Rees (Computing)

Programming a computer is a fun thing to do, and all ages can do it. We have lots of different ways you can get started, or to learn more if you already know how to code. Come along and join in; bring your packed lunch along!

Combined Cadet Force

Form II – VI, Fridays after school, Terms 1, 2 and 3. Cost £73.50.

All kit (apart from boots) is issued.

The Combined Cadet Force is a thriving co-curricular organisation for pupils at Dollar. The CCF provides a framework through which cadets can develop qualities of endurance, resourcefulness, self-reliance, responsibility and leadership. It also aims to engender a sense of public service. The contingent at Dollar has a 'section' from each of the three services: Navy, Army and RAF. Membership of the CCF is voluntary and pupils may join in Forms II – VI.

We parade on Friday evenings 3.30pm – 4.45pm, when we cover the training syllabus for all sections. We encourage skills in radios, weapons, engines, power and sailboats, gliders and powered aircraft. Under the leadership of trained experts, it opens the possibility of mountain work, sub aqua, skiing and flying to name but a few. Dollar CCF has an extremely successful shooting program with cadets regularly gaining the opportunity to shoot nationally and internationally. In addition to the weekly training, each term we organise one or two weekends away; longer camps are always organised during the holidays. As well as the UK based camps and visits, there will be opportunities for cadets to travel abroad.

The CCF Royal Navy section provides pupils with the opportunity to gain RYA qualifications in Dinghy Sailing, Powerboating and Day Skipper and Competent Crew Sailing run principally on courses in Plymouth or Portsmouth. In addition to this, pupils gain leadership skills as they progress through the section with valuable opportunities to manage and teach the section on the latter years.

The CCF is directed and managed by a dedicated team of staff. These are members of the teaching staff who have been commissioned into the forces with officer status and trained specifically to serve the cadet force. We also have our own full-time Contingent Executive Officer, Capt MP Scott, who deals with all administrative matters within the CCF. In addition to our own CCF officers we are routinely visited by regular forces service personnel.

Community Service

Forms I – VI. Various days, Terms 1, 2 and 3. Further details from the Community Service Co-ordinator Mrs MacBean (EDT)

Dollar pupils are involved in a number of projects supporting people and places in the local and wider community as detailed below. Most opportunities require a long term commitment but there are also "one off" activities. All those interested are invited to register interest with Mrs MacBean in the first instance.

British Heart Foundation Youth Volunteers Pupils will receive training in the issues surrounding heart disease and will then raise awareness in others by speaking to their form classes and/or year group assemblies. There are further opportunities to take this new skill out into the community. An excellent opportunity for those seeking a medical profession or those who enjoy, or wish to develop, public speaking skills. Training times to be arranged but will be during the school day so suitable for all ages.

Play Alloa

A youth club for young adults with mental or physical disabilities. Pupils attend the club on Monday evenings in Alloa to play games, use the iPads or just chat and make friends. Suitable for the older pupils owing to the timings. There is also a Saturday Play Alloa which provides play and social opportunities for children and young people with special needs. This takes place at their Tillicoultry centre.

Strathdevon Primary School

Support your local primary school by providing a skill of your choice during lunch play time - i.e. supporting staff during sporting activities. An excellent opportunity for work experience within a school for aspiring teachers. Further opportunities available to Form VI pupils who can offer academic support through paired reading during a free period.

Hillfoots Rugby Club

12 volunteer coaches to help out on a Sunday morning – possibility to undertake level 1 coaching certificate for those interested. Minimum commitment of 4 weeks required and suitable for Form III and above with rugby experience or a desire to learn. This is by no means exclusive to male rugby players – girls would be very welcome, with training provided.

Computer Training for the Elderly Community A four-week course offering basic computer skills training to elderly members of the community. Pupils provide one-to one tuition tailored for the client's needs e.g. sending and receiving e-mails, internet shopping, storage of photographs or simply how to use a mouse. Pupils experience the joy that teaching can bring and how a new skill can change a life, a recent client learnt how to shop online and SKYPE her grandchildren. Form IV – VI Wednesday 3.45 – 5.00pm. Second half Terms 1, 2 & 3.

Dollar Scout Group are always looking for extra help with their Beaver and Cub packs. This requires either a termly or half term commitment of one evening a week on a Thursday or Friday.

The same applies for the **Dollar Brownies and Rainbows** which runs on a Tuesday and Thursday after school 3.30–5.00pm and 6.30-8pm.

There will be further opportunities in physical environmental projects through the **The Woodland Trust** where training for volunteers can be provided in various things including dry stone-walling, environmental survey techniques and tree planting.

Seamab School is a small residential school for primary aged pupils who are in the care of the local authority. The life experiences of these children are very different from pupils that attend mainstream education and we are planning to provide some positive sporting and musical experiences for the children that is out with from their normal daily routine.

Artistic - During the VI Form activity week our pupil worked with the children designing and creating playground games. We will be continuing this work over the year and it would be a regular commitment for Form VI pupils who have a free period 3 or 4 on a Friday. A Saturday all-day spring clean-up day is also planned and open to all senior year groups.

Gardening

The team will help to maintain a small garden which was created by our Form VI pupils during the summer term. The Garden is located in Gibson Court, Dollar and is already being enjoyed by the elderly residents. No gardening experience is required as expert advice is on hand from the Dollar Horticultural Society. Visits will take place at lunchtime on alternate Fridays, and there will also be a couple of afterschool visits during the spring term.

The Japanese Garden

The team supported the re-opening of this local garden during Scottish Gardens Schemes Open Day. Pupils were trained as guides to the gardens themselves and also helped raise funds in the café. This gave pupils an insight into event management and the wonders of horticulture. We are maintaining a relationship with the gardens, including biological surveys with the science department and any future events will be announced.

Beach Clean Up

Supporting the work of the Marine Conservation Society by collecting plastic from our local beaches. The clean-ups will be carried out on a Saturday or Sunday during the autumn and Spring Terms, dates to be confirmed. This is recommended activity for potential Biologists and Environmentalists and is open to all senior year groups.

Open More Doors

A local group dedicated to fundraising for charities, we will be supporting several fundraising events throughout the year giving pupils the opportunity to gain some hands on experience of event production. The first event is Nov 9th at Tulliallan Castle in aid of Women's Aid and Crossroads. Priority is given to senior pupils but all interested should see Mrs MacBean.

Riding for the Disabled

14 years of age and over, Wednesday 5.30-7.30pm. Wellhall Cottage (Blairingone) Terms 1 and 3 (with options for volunteering during the second term too).

Kit required: Strong footwear and old clothes Further details from Dr Scheuerl (Chemistry)

This activity consists of helping the staff and volunteers at the Forth Valley Riding for the Disabled Association by Blairingone when they have groups of disabled adults/children from the local area, and is a much appreciated and worthwhile task.

The Riding for the Disabled Association is dedicated to improving the lives of people with disabilities, through the provision of opportunities for riding, enabling people to improve their health and wellbeing, and encouraging confidence and self-worth whilst having fun.

No previous experience is necessary as volunteers are taught how to tack and groom the horses and to take the leading rein for walks outdoors in the better weather or for exercises in the indoor arena. Volunteering one evening per week can contribute towards the Service section of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme and can provide excellent work experience for those considering a career working with Disabled.

Conversation Club

Forms I – VI, Mondays 12.35–1.15pm. Location: P22. Terms 1, 2 and 3. Further details from Mrs Burbury (Support for Learning)

This is primarily, although not exclusively, an activity for pupils for whom English is an additional language. The emphasis is on sharing conversation, socialising and building confidence during informal lunchtime sessions. A number of visits are arranged during the course of the year depending on the interests of the group, allowing them to experience something of Scotland's landscape, heritage and culture in its wider context.

Cookery Club (in conjunction with Eco Group)

Form I - VI, Monday 3.30 – 4.30pm. Location: H2 (Iona Building) Term 1.

Kit required: Container to transport food.

Further details from Mrs O'Donnell (Home Economics)

Practical and organisational food skills will be taught during these sessions which will allow participants to develop existing food preparation skills, gain confidence and independence when following a recipe. Recipes will be appropriate to the skills and the requirements of the participants. Allergies and dietary requirements will be accommodated.

Miss McCord will be working with the Home Economics Department to share her cooking experiences and allow pupils the opportunity to undertake some of the challenges she faced on MasterChef UK. The club will be open to pupils in FIII and FIV, but numbers will be limited. Any keen cooks should watch out for notices where more information about the format and how to sign up will be publicised.

Craft Club

Form I – VI. Wednesdays 12.30–1.25pm. Location: EDT. Terms 1 and 2. Further details available from Mrs Webster (EDT)

Pupils undertake a variety of both traditional and modern craft projects. Allows pupils to design and make products that we are able to do during class time. No previous experience necessary, just a willingness to learn. Workshop based projects include: wooden toys, boxes, and photograph frames. Contemporary projects including; laser cut jewellery, Hallowe'en decorations, paper cut gifts and cards. A good way to develop fine motor skills and creativity.

Craft Club - Junior 2

Junior 2. Fridays 3.30–4.30pm. Location: Junior School. Terms 1 & 2. Further details from Mrs Neill (Junior School)

Be creative! This is a great opportunity to have a go at a variety of craft activities – jewellery making, salt dough craft, book making, designing greeting cards, tapestry, decopatch, collage. This is the perfect way to develop your design skills whatever the craft.

Cricket - Boys

Cricket is a major sport at Dollar Academy and is very popular with both boys and girls. Further details from the PE department.

Training at both individual and group level takes place during the winter, often incorporating high-level technical instruction and video analysis. These sessions, both at lunch time and Monday and Friday evenings, start after October break and are led by Mr Peter Ross (Level 3 coach and Assistant Scotland Wildcats coach). During the summer term the cricket programme has a full fixture card for all junior and senior teams in the school, including 1st XI matches against the MCC and the Forty Club. We start developing cricket with Kwik Cricket sessions in Prep 4-5 at lunch times and all year groups above that age group receive at least two training sessions a week. The school puts out, in addition to the 1st XI, a 2nd XI, a Colts XI (U15 side) a F2 team, two F1 & Junior 2 teams and a Junior 1 squad.

The 1st XI competes in, and has had great success in, the U18 HMC Scottish schools T20 competition. The 1st XI were joint holders of the cup in its first year and were worthy winners in 2018. The U15 team were also winners of the Scottish Schools U15 Cup in the same year.

Dollar has produced a number of cricket internationalists over the years and players at all age groups are often selected for regional and national teams.

Cricket - Girls

Prep 4 & 5 Cricket skills - Wednesday (tbc) Lunchtime. Term 3

Junior 1 – Form VI. Terms 2 & 3. Squad sessions for all girls Further details from Mrs Childs (Mathematics)

Cricketers of all abilities are welcome at the girls' cricket club. In term 2, indoor practices are held at lunchtimes to develop skills. Outdoor practices in term 3 are tailored to the experience of the girls involved. J1 and 2 girls learn cricket skills through Kwik cricket games at lunchtimes and after school while hard ball skills are practised after school at senior practices for those who of an appropriate skill level. The Junior School team plays in Kwik cricket tournaments and the school enters teams into the National Schools tournament in June.

Kit required: Clean training shoes, loose, warm clothing

Cost: c. £4 per practice/match.

Curling club is open to all year groups and any interested pupil, no matter what their level of ability or experience. There will be several 'come and try it' sessions for complete beginners. We enter several cup competitions and a league against local schools for anyone with a little more experience.

Cyber Security Club

Cyber Discovery is HM Government's co-curricular programme turning teenagers across the country into cyber security experts. For pupils aged 13-18, this programme is seeking problem solvers, code crackers and, most importantly, those who never give up. The Cyber Discovery Club will give access to computers and resources and also to a dedicated time and place to work through the challenges with like-minded individuals. You will start by testing your natural creativity, problem solving ability and curiosity. Then you will be given the opportunity to take on the role of a security agent to crack codes and stop cyber criminals in their tracks.

DAJO 1 (Dollar Academy Jazz Orchestra)

Form III – VI. Rehearsals Tuesdays & Fridays 12.50 – 1.20pm. Location: Auditorium.

Kit required: Instrument

Further details from Mr Burbury (Assistant Rector)

DAJO rehearse twice a week and perform at various events throughout the year. In previous years this has included performing at the Usher Hall in Edinburgh and the Perth Concert Hall to the March concerts and are a popular feature of the senior school Christmas Dances. Performers audition for their places and play repertoire from big band standards to popular jazz music and sometimes includes vocal numbers.

DAJO 2 (Dollar Academy Jazz Orchestra)

This activity is open to Form I-VI wind, brass and percussion instrumentalists who would like to play in a big band/jazz orchestra environment. The band will work towards a concert in March in the Auditorium; however, there may be opportunities to perform before Christmas. Pupils will experience the excitement of performing in live situations and build their confidence and skills in instrumental playing.

Debating Prep

The club is open to all P4 and P5 children who are interested in discussing issues with their peers in an open and constructive manner.

Debating Form III-VI

The art of debate involves mastering skills of obvious value: the confidence to speak in public, and make sense; the construction of a logical argument; the ability to read an audience's reactions; and, perhaps, most importantly, the willingness to hear others' arguments, and to respond to them. The Debating Society allows pupils to develop all of these skills while discussing issues of great political, ethical, economic and social importance, preparing our pupils even more effectively for the world beyond Dollar.

Kit required: With the exception of dry suit, kit is supplied until qualified as a Branch Diver. Further details from Mrs Robb (PE).

Learning in a safe and controlled environment, under the auspices of The Scottish Sub Aqua Club, the skills required for scuba diving. There is the possibility of carrying these skills on into open water situations and gaining internationally recognised scuba diving qualifications which can be built upon as your experience grows at any time in your future. Those already holding some level of qualification will be awarded credit for this under the SSAC system and can then build on their foundation knowledge. Internationally recognised qualification. Further training can lead to Instructor qualification.

The Award at Bronze level is open to all pupils in Form III. Those pupils who complete Bronze can go on to take part in Silver in Form IV and then Gold during Forms V & VI.

Bronze registration occurs at the start of Form III. Expedition work takes place in May and September/October for Bronze Candidates (end of Form III and start of Form IV), and in June for Silver (Form IV) and Gold (Form V) candidates. Compulsory attendance is required for expedition preparation sessions which take place prior to the expedition itself. A kit list is available for the expedition part of the award on the school DofE website.

The DofE Award is an internationally recognised programme of personal development which involves pupils participating in four activity areas: Volunteering, Physical Recreation, Skills and Expedition. Progress through the Award and successful completion relies on initiative, commitment and determination from candidates, and this achievement is recognised by the award of a badge and certificate; Gold Awards are also presented at Prize-giving and also an annual Presentation at Holyrood Palace. The school organises and provides opportunities for completion of the Expedition section but participation in all other sections must be arranged by the candidates themselves. The school offers a varied programme of co-curricular activities that can be used by pupils to fulfil the requirements of their DofE programme. The Award at Bronze level is open to all pupils in Form III. Those pupils who complete Bronze can go on to take part in Silver in Form IV and then Gold in Form V & VI.

The final exam will take place in May 2020 and students will be issued certificates in August 2020.

A similar programme is offered for guest pupils in Dollar.

Fellbach (Germany): Taiwan (China)

Work Experience in Germany or China undertaken by pupils wishing to sharpen their fluency. Accommodation is on the basis of reciprocal hospitality. Pupils are placed in firms where they observe and help out with the work of the company, thereby putting their language skills to intensive practical use. This can be combined with a "desk-to-desk" stay, giving longer-term exposure to language use.

The Modern Languages Department is also active in encouraging pupils to undertake extended individuals stays on the continent; possibilities include "desk to desk" exchanges, summer jobs, au-pair work and gap years assistantships.

Form II Monday and Thursday $3.30\,\mathrm{pm}-5.30\,\mathrm{pm}$ (Terms 1~&~2). Form II CCF Recruits who have passed their weapon handling safety test may join a training programme on Thursdays in addition to Friday CCF Session. The sessions are divided into $20~\mathrm{minute}$ 'details' and thus attendance to the whole time is not required. The programme is progressively selective; the top $20~\mathrm{or}$ so at the end of March will be invited to further training in Form III. All applications and administration are handled through CCF on Fridays.

The aim of these sessions is to learn and practise the skills required to enjoy target rifle shooting in a safe and friendly environment. The sport is also recognised as an important discipline by the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme and is proving more popular every year. Shooting can be incorporated into all three levels of the scheme with pupils learning Rifle Safety, Range Management, Marksmanship skills and concluding with a formal exam.

Pupils who reach the required standard are given the opportunity to join the school's 1st squad, and to participate in Scottish, British, and Commonwealth competitions throughout the year. The first two terms are spent primarily on Small-bore (indoor) shooting, with the focus of the third term on Full-bore (outdoor) shooting, culminating in July with the Ashburton competition, a meeting of all British CCF's at Bisley; Dollar won this in 2005 and 2013. The school's elite then shoot the Imperial Meeting, which include the best shots world-wide. They also have the opportunity to apply for places on the UK Cadets Channel Islands Tour and The Canada Tour as a member of the elite The Athelings Team.
